A group of delegates from the Executive Board of the Petroleum Authority of Thailand (PTT) led by H.E. Dr. Piyasawat Amranand, Chairman and Former Minister of Energy; and including the CEO of PTT, Mr. Pairin Chuchotethaworn, and other members of the Board, visited the International Ocean Institute in Malta on the 6<sup>th</sup> May. The group met with IOI Honorary President, Dr Awni Behnam and IOI Managing Director, Antonella Vassallo as well as with high officials from the University of Malta including Rector Professor Juanito Camilleri; Pro-Rector for Academic Affairs, Professor Alfred Vella; Professor Simone Borg, Deputy Dean of the Faculty of Laws and Coordinator of the MA Degree in Ocean Governance, as well as others.

During the very cordial meeting, presentations on the International Ocean Institute, the University of Malta, and the Master of Arts Degree in Ocean Governance were provided to the PTT delegation in view



of their interest and support to this MA degree course being offered jointly by the Faculty of Laws of the University of Malta and the IOI. The Petroleum Authority of Thailand, following on the Royal visit of HRH Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn to the IOI and the University of Malta last August 2014, have already kindly provided two full scholarships to outstanding Thai students to attend the MA Degree in Ocean Governance in Malta. Other discussions centred on the IOI's Regional Ocean Governance Training Programme planned in Thailand for launch in 2016/2017.

## IOI prepares to launch a new Regional Training Programme in South America and the Caribbean in 2016

21<sup>st</sup> April 2015; Geneva

*IOI prepares to launch a new Regional Training Programme in South America and the Caribbean in 2016; the IOI Operational Centre in Brazil will spearhead the training, supported by the IOI Centre in Costa Rica. Report of the Planning Meeting.*

In order to further strengthen the implementation of IOI's strategy on capacity building and the provision of the regionally focussed training programmes in ocean governance a meeting was convened in Geneva to discuss the proposal for a new training programme on ocean governance for South America and the Caribbean. The meeting, which built on the momentum generated earlier in Malta for the IOI training support centres, was attended by Mahin Faghfour, Vice President, IOI; Awni Behnam, IOI Honorary President; Peter Leder, Treasurer; Eduardo Marone, Director, IOI Operational Centre in Brazil and Antonella Vassallo, Managing Director at the IOI HQ. The new regional Training Programme in South America and the Caribbean is planned for launch in 2016 and it will be coordinated and offered through the IOI Operational Centre in Brazil with the close support of the IOI Centre in Costa Rica.

The planned two to three week training programme was discussed intensively by the group, based on the draft programme prepared by IOI Brazil Director Dr Eduardo Marone, and a number of innovative proposals were discussed, amongst them the possibility of offering the training programme in rotation amongst the target countries surrounding the regional oceans in order to maximise the opportunities for interested participants to attend. Another proposal which fitted very closely with the IOI training philosophy was the possibility to offer special topics or seminars in addition to IOI's core content to reflect the interests, issues and current realities faced by each programme host country thus making the training programme especially relevant and targeted year on year. As foreseen in the IOI Strategy adopted by the Governing Board in December 2014, this proposed training programme already benefits from the close support offered through the IOI Centre in Costa Rica, directed by Dr Alejandro Gutierrez, to synergise efforts in coordinating the programme and to publicise it through joint networking and outreach actions. The Geneva meeting follows on the actions already planned during the meeting of the IOI Directors held in Malta last March and reported in the IOInforma 0215.

During his visit to New York to represent the IOI at the 16<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the United Nations Open-ended Informal Consultative Process (ICP) on Oceans and the Law of the Sea Dr Awni Behnam was also invited to speak to the 2015 group of Nippon Fellows.

Dr Behnam gave a presentation about Maritime Transport and Seaborne Trade, giving a brief history of the development of maritime law as well as touching on the biggest challenges currently being faced. The Fellows provided very positive feedback on the presentation and appreciated, in particular, the information shared by Dr Behnam based on his long-standing experience and insight on maritime transport, but also on the negotiations leading to the adoption of UNCLOS and the development of the law of the sea in general.
